What's Changed Recently?

Refer to this section often to learn of new content and features on Church Web sites. We will also highlight from time to time new Church publications and audiovisual materials. This section will soon be converted to a Web page with the ability to subscribe by [RSS](#) or e-mail to be notified when new information is added.

April 26, 2007: A test release of the redesigned missionary Web site is now available at [beta.mormon.org](#). The new site includes multimedia and the option for nonmembers to "chat live" with missionaries (Church members should not use the chat feature). While on the beta site, use the feedback option to tell us what you think.

April 25, 2007: A country Web site was launched for Slovenia. This brings the total number of Church country Web sites to 62. You can see the complete list of sites at [lds.org/countries](#).

April 16, 2007: A country Web site was launched for the Republic of Ireland. It used to be part of the site for the United Kingdom, but now has its own site. The U.K. site serves England, Wales, Scotland, and Northern Ireland.

March 2, 2007: Additional materials from the February 10th worldwide leadership training meeting on teaching and learning are now available [online](#).

March 2, 2007: Chapter numbers have been added to the tables of contents for all the manuals and support materials in the Gospel Library. This should assist users in identifying the correct chapter for weekly lessons.

February 28, 2007: Materials from the February 10th worldwide leadership training meeting on teaching and learning are now available [online](#).

February 15, 2007: The MP3 audio files of the Book of Mormon, Doctrine and Covenants, and Pearl of Great Price have now been renamed (with appropriate metadata included) so they appear and play in the proper sequence. See scriptures.lds.org.

February 8, 2007: The Newsroom site has been redesigned. You can access the new site (1) by looking in the News and Events channel on the home page of LDS.org, (2) by clicking the link at the bottom right of the LDS.org home page, or (3) by going directly to newsroom.lds.org. The Newsroom site is the official resource for news media, opinion leaders, and the public. You can also find news written especially for members of the Church under the News and Events channel of LDS.org.

Highlights

New LDS.org and Gospel Library Release

A redesigned home page and key pages of LDS.org were released January 30, 2007. Other pages of Church Web sites will be rebuilt in 2007 and following years. This represents a major upgrade of software and infrastructure to allow the Church to build and maintain Web sites more efficiently and in [multiple languages](#). It also provides [improved navigation](#), [enhanced search](#), and a [redesigned Gospel Library](#).

Improved Navigation

To improve the navigation and keep the home page clean and usable, all content on LDS.org has been categorized into six major channels, which are shown in the left of the top blue section of the home page. Each channel name is a link that you can click to go to the channel page. Or, you can simply place your cursor on the channel name (without clicking) to see a fly-out list of sections within the channel. This provides one-click access to 54 different sections of LDS.org.

The following is a **quick-reference list** of high-use pages and where they are now found:

- Broadcast: From the News and Events channel, see Events; then click Broadcasts in the left navigation bar.
- Calendar: See the News and Events channel.
- Church Employment: From the Home and Family channel, see Employment.
- Institutes of Religion: From the Home and Family channel, see Education.
- LDS Philanthropies: From the About the Church channel, see Giving to the Church.
- Meetinghouse Locator: See the About the Church channel.
- Order Church Materials: See the Gospel Library channel.
- Places to Visit: See the About the Church channel.
- Receive News/Quotes by E-mail: From the News and Events channel, see Free E-mail Subscriptions.
- RSS: See lds.org/rss.
- Scriptures: See the Gospel Library channel.
- Share the Gospel with a Friend: See the right sash on the About the Church channel page.
- Stake and Ward Sites: See the About the Church channel or the bottom-right corner of the LDS.org home page.

Note: If you can't find what you're looking for, try the A-Z Index at the top of any new Web page. It's a table of contents for all Church Web sites.

Quick Navigation Tips:

- To return to the home page from any new Web page, just click on the Church logo.
- Headings are often hyperlinks. For example, when you are reading a magazine, you can click the heading Magazines to return to the magazines home page. You can click the heading Gospel Library to return to the home page of the Gospel Library.

Enhanced Search

The search feature of the old LDS.org only allowed you to search for materials in the Gospel Library. The new search function allows you to search across all Church Web sites as well as the Gospel Library. Search is now located at the top of every new page.

Over the next several weeks, you will see improved search results as we continue to add

materials to the master index and refine the search algorithms. Articles and talks by the First Presidency and Quorum of the Twelve Apostles will rank higher than articles by others, more recent content will rank higher than older content, and key pages on Church sites will receive extra prominence.

The search function allows you to perform searches for a word or phrase. Search for an exact phrase by enclosing the phrase within quotation marks. You can choose to search All Church Content (including Church Web sites and the whole Gospel Library), just the Gospel Library, or specific portions of the library. When you search from a specific page in a Web site, the search will allow you to search just that section or more broadly.

Using the Advanced Search Options, you can limit your search to specific dates or authors.

Once you see the results of your search, you then have the option to narrow (filter) those results to see only those from the scriptures, general conference, lesson manuals, or magazines. Note that scripture results will not appear in the list of results unless you click Filter by Scriptures.

Redesigned Gospel Library

The new Gospel Library has been restructured to make it much easier to find magazines, lessons manuals, and other official publications of the Church. (Note: Books written by General Authorities that are not published by the Church may be available online at deseretbook.com or at the sites of other publishers.)

Once you find an item in the Gospel Library, the format bar above the text provides several options, including:

- Print. This provides a nicely-formatted copy for printing.
- View. This allows you to view the item in its full graphical layout as a PDF file. For now, we provide a single PDF of the entire publication. To see it, go to the Table of Contents for the whole magazine or manual and click View on the format bar. (Note that PDFs of magazines only go back to 2001, even though text of the magazines goes back to 1971, because of copyright restrictions). For future publications, we will provide PDFs of individual articles in magazines and individual chapters in manuals. To see them, click View on the

format bar of the article or chapter. If there is no View as PDF option, go to the table of contents page to see the PDF file of the entire publication. You can then advance to the article or chapter. Once you've found the PDF, you can read it online, print all or part of it using the Adobe Reader command buttons that appear inside the window, or download the PDF by clicking the Adobe Reader command button labeled Save a Copy.

- Listen. If an audio recording of the item is available, this option will be visible.
- Watch. If a video recording of the item is available, this option will be visible. Sign language videos are also included here when they are available.

The contents page of a publication will often have PDF, audio, or video files for the entire publication in a single .zip file.

During 2007, we will be adding more [audio](#), [video](#), and PDF files to the Gospel Library in English and [many other languages](#).

We will keep the old Gospel Library running for some time, although we have stopped publishing new materials to the old library. If you have links on your personal or business Web sites to content in the Gospel Library, we recommend you change those links to the new library. Stay tuned to ldswebguy.com for instructions.

New Home Page

The following is an overview of the redesigned home page of LDS.org:



1. The top section of the home page lists the major channels of LDS.org as described in the section [Improved Navigation](#).

2. The toolbar at the top of the page includes Search, A-Z Index, Feedback, Help, and Languages.
 - Learn more about [how to use Search](#).
 - A-Z Index. This index provides an alphabetical listing of the resources available on Church Web sites.
 - Feedback. This page allows you to report technical problems with the site, as well as share ideas about future site enhancements and resources. We read all the feedback, but can't personally respond to each suggestion.
 - Help. The Help page provides a reference to site functionality and features.
 - Languages. This Language link provides a list of the materials in other languages available on LDS.org today. Later this year, LDS.org will be translated into nine more languages: Chinese, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Portuguese, Russian, and Spanish. At that time, this language link will change the language for the entire site. Over the next several months, we will add materials to the Gospel Library in 32 additional languages.
3. The Features area highlights resources and announcements of general interest. You can read previous features by clicking the Past Features link at the bottom of the features area.
4. The left column of the bottom section provides a quick link to the current First Presidency Message and Visiting Teaching Message, as well as an inspirational quote.
5. The right column of the bottom section provides a search box and links to pages with quick references helpful in preparing a lesson or a talk. In the bottom right are quick links to go to stake and ward Web sites, Mormon.org, the Newsroom, and the FamilySearch site.
6. The footer at the bottom of the page contains links and information pages for your convenience.

Help in Transitioning to the New LDS.org

Nearly all the links on the home page of the old LDS.org are found in the 54 fly-outs from the six major channels listed in the left of the top blue section of the new home page. If you don't see the link you are looking for, click directly on one of the six major channels (not the fly-outs) and your link will likely be referenced on that

channel page. Some sites, such as Provident Living, are not listed by name in the fly-outs because all the content of those sites is incorporated topically in the fly-out sections.

If you have bookmarked pages from the old LDS.org, many of them will still work because until mid 2007, we will keep these old pages active. However, you should find and bookmark the new pages.

We will also keep the old Gospel Library active until mid or late 2007 so any links or bookmarks you have will still work. However, you may now want to find the items in the new library and change your bookmarks to these new items. If you have many links to change, you may wish to wait until we incorporate friendly URLs (Web addresses) such as [lds.org/ensign/2006/January](#). When this is implemented, we will publish the rules for constructing these URLs. Stay tuned to [ldsWebguy.com](#) for instructions.

We will also soon create subdomain names (shortcuts) to help you quickly go to key areas of the Web site, such as [temples.lds.org](#) and [ces.lds.org](#). We will provide a complete list of these subdomain names when they become active.

New or Revised Content

Audio MP3 Files

You can find files in MP3 format to listen to or download on the audio page at [lds.org/audio](#). Audio files are also available on the format bar throughout the new Gospel Library when there is an audio version of the item (such as *Ensign* magazines and key manuals). On the contents page, you can download all the audio files at once in a single .zip file.

You can listen to (stream) the audio files or download them to listen to later or copy to a CD, handheld device, or MP3 player. Over the next several months, we will provide many more audio files in several languages.

All new audio files we create for download will be MP3 format (with an ID3 tag version of 2.3 or newer), which is compatible with a variety of operating systems (including Windows, Macintosh, and Linux) and with a variety of

media players (such as iTunes, Windows Media Player, RealPlayer, and QuickTime). You will notice that there are still some old Windows Media files throughout Church Web sites, but those will eventually be converted to MP3.

For live events, such as general conference and other broadcasts, the live streaming is currently done in Windows Media format, although we expect to change that to MP3 in the future. The new standard for voice audio files is 32 kBit/s, 22,050 Hz, mono, and for music audio files the standard is 128 kBits/s, 44.1 kHz, stereo (again, some old files are not yet at these standards).

A-Z Index

If you don't know where a particular Internet resource is found, click **A-Z Index** at the top of the screen to see an alphabetical listing of all available content. You may wish to browse through the entire index for an overview of what is available.

Braille

Many of the Church's official publications are currently provided for Braille users in .brf and .txt format for use on an electronic Braille note taker (such as Braille Lite, Type 'N Speak, or Packmate) or a Braille embosser (such as Blazer or Versa Point). The .brf files are formatted in grade 2, contracted English Braille. See the English Braille page at lds.org/braille to see what is available. These files are also available on the format bar throughout the new Gospel Library.

CES Firesides

Transcripts of CES firesides are available at ces.lds.org. Later, they will be incorporated into the Gospel Library.

Combating Pornography

This new section of LDS.org (combatingpornography.lds.org) provides suggestions on avoiding or overcoming the destructive influences of pornography. Church pamphlets on the subject are available on this site.

Country Web Sites

Church Web sites are created in each country under the direction of Area Presidencies as an official Church Internet presence in a given country. Country Sites provide a positive Church presence in the language of the country

and contain a history of the Church in the country, information about local events, news from the Area Presidency, and other information. There are 61 country Web sites now, with another eight in development. See a list of them at lds.org/countries.

Education

This new page in the Home and Family channel of LDS.org provides information and resources about education and specific information about literacy, seminary, institute, the Perpetual Education Fund, and Church colleges and universities.

Employment

This new page in the Home and Family channel provides helps for finding and improving your employment, including access to an employment resources database, listings of Church job opportunities, and Church-service mission opportunities.

Gospel Topics

This new section of the Gospel Library provides succinct information about the doctrine, policies, practices, and history of the Church.

Home and Family

This channel contains links to resources for individuals and parents, such as building a strong family, education, employment, family home evening, food storage and emergency preparedness, managing finances, and marriage and family counseling.

News and Events

This channel of LDS.org that provides news for members has been redesigned. The previous site included the following two sections:

- *News from the Church*, which is written by Church magazines staff writers as an expansion of the news found in the *Ensign* and *Liahona* magazines.
- *Church in the News*, which includes references to articles about the Church that have appeared in other newspapers and magazines.

These two sections have now been merged together in the redesigned News and Events channel page.

Articles published in the [Church News](#) are not searchable in the new LDS.org site because *Church News* is a publication of the [Deseret Morning News newspaper](#), and they make the

full *Church News* available online only to subscribers. Read the [explanation of that policy](#) for more information.

Newsroom

[Newsroom.lds.org](#) is the official resource for news media, opinion leaders, and the public. It is available in English only because information in other languages is available on [country Web sites](#).

The Newsroom site was redesigned in February 2007 to be more useful in communicating with the news media, academics, other opinion leaders, and members of the public who are looking to find factual material on the Church quickly and easily. The new site includes more multimedia, such as the *World Report*, a semiannual summary of what is happening in the Church around the world.

Pictures

Many Church-related pictures and photographs are now available online. See a list of images in the Media Formats section of the Gospel Library.

Podcasts

Three trial podcasts are available on LDS.org for a limited time:

- [General Conference Broadcast archives page](#) has a trial audio podcast.
- [Teachings of Presidents of the Church: Spencer W. Kimball](#) offers a podcast of the audio recording of the manual and a PDF of the full graphic layout of the manual.

We invite you to subscribe to these podcasts and share with us your experience and suggestions at ldspodcasting@ldschurch.org. An evaluation of their use and effectiveness will determine the schedule and extent of future podcasts on LDS.org.

RSS Feeds

RSS ("Really Simple Syndication") is a way to subscribe to content, such as news headlines or other information, and be informed when the content changes. You can choose to receive notifications by e-mail, or you can have RSS messages (called a "feeds") appear on your personal Web page (such as a My Yahoo! page). RSS feeds contain titles, short descriptions, and links to the originating site. By subscribing to RSS feeds, you can be informed

about changes to Church Web sites without having to constantly visit the sites to see what is new. We provide RSS feeds of some content on Church Web sites and will continue to provide more. See [lds.org/rss](#) for the latest listing of RSS-enabled Church Web pages.

Scriptures

The online scriptures program at [scriptures.lds.org](#) allows you to read the scriptures online, including the footnotes, study aids, maps, and photographs available in the printed LDS edition.

This online program is available in English, French, German, Italian, and Spanish. More languages will be added in 2007.

The program allows you to read and mark scriptures and copy text to word processor files. A powerful search allows you to find specific phrases or topics.

The [Options](#) allow you to adjust the page margins to make the text easier to read.

From any chapter of scriptures, you can click Listen at the top of the screen to hear an audio recording of that chapter. You can download the audio (MP3) files of all chapters from the audio page in the Gospel Library ([lds.org/audio](#)). You can then listen to them from your computer, burn a CD, or transfer them to a handheld device or MP3 player.

Serving in the Church

This site has expanded information for Church leaders and teachers about various callings, including guidelines, resources, and new online training courses.

Videos

Many Church sites provide video that can be watched (streamed) or downloaded to watch later or copy to a CD or DVD. Additional videos will be listed at [videos.lds.org](#). For events such as [general conference](#), we provide files for entire sessions as well as for individual talks in English, ASL, and Spanish. In other languages, files are available only for the entire sessions.

Our standard for all new video we create for download is to create it in the following formats:

- Windows Media 8 300K (Broadcast archives include 56K version)
- Windows Media 10 MBR (Multi-bit Rate), which allows multiple quality levels in the same file)

- QuickTime h.264 MOV 320x240, which is optimized for QuickTime desktop play and to work on current Apple iPod video devices.
- MPEG 2 VOB, which can be used to copy to a DVD to be played through DVD players.

We believe these standards provide an acceptable experience for both broadband and dial-up users using both PC and Mac computers.

Not all videos on Church sites currently meet these standards, but all new media we create will meet these standards. Some video may also be provided in Flash or Virtual Reality (circular panoramas), such as videos on the [Joseph Smith site](#).

Temples

[Temples.lds.org](#) gives information about the purpose of temples as well as specific details about each temple, including schedules, addresses, and other information. We recently added more temple pictures and plan to include more in the near future.

Interesting Church Web Sites

Church History

This channel of LDS.org has information about the history of the Church, historic sites, museums, the Church History Library, Church Archives, and BYU resources. [Country Web sites](#) also provide a history of the Church within specific countries.

E-mail Subscriptions (List Services)

Sign up for a number of free-mail subscriptions on the News and Events channel page. You can receive daily updates on Church news and gospel-centered quotations on a number of topics, or you can subscribe to the What's New e-mail for information when Church Web sites are updated or new Church products are released.

Handheld (PDA)

We currently provide Church magazines, lesson manuals, and other Church publications for handheld PDA devices. A listing of these files can be found at [lds.org/handheld](#).

Formats include five readers for Palm (MarkMyScriptures, Mobipocket, iSilo, eReader, and Plucker) and six readers for the Pocket PC (MarkMyScriptures, Mobipocket, iSilo, eReader,

MSReader, and YanCEyWare). Other Church-related content may be available on the Web sites of the companies that provide the readers.

Humanitarian Services

[Lds.org/humanitarianservices](#) provides timely information about the Church's response to natural disasters and links to major humanitarian initiatives sponsored by the Church.

Joseph Smith Site

[JosephSmith.lds.org](#) provides a wealth of research articles, quotes, and other historical information about the Prophet Joseph Smith, as well as photographs, paintings, and archive documents.

LDS Philanthropies

[LDSPhilanthropies.org](#) provides information about making donations to the Church and its institutions—beyond tithing and fast offerings—with the goal of helping members and friends of the Church meet the needs of people worldwide. Along with information about the charitable causes supported by the Church, the site enables users to make online donations.

Meetinghouse Locator

Traveling or moving? Use this program to find the nearest Church meetinghouse in many countries around the world. The site is currently available in English only, but will be translated into more languages in the future. If you ever find outdated information, please submit feedback to give us the correction.

Mormon.org

This site provides concise information about Church doctrines and practices and is written for those who know little about the Church but want to learn more. It is available in many languages. A test version of the recently redesigned site is available at [beta.mormon.org](#).

Music

The Church Music site in the Gospel Library has a wealth of digital and sheet music and an award-winning interactive player that allows you to select from hundreds of hymns and children's songs and play them live. You can change the key or tempo, or just listen to the soprano, alto, tenor, or bass part. The Other Music section of the Church Music site has sound tracks of

seminary music and sheet music that has been published in Church magazines. Music is being added in Spanish and other languages.

Order Church Materials

You can order Church materials—including temple clothing—online at LDSCatalog.com and have your order sent to your home. New sites are being built to serve other parts of the world.

Provident Living

ProvidentLiving.org contains information about living a provident life, including employment and career development, physical health, emotional strength, education and literacy, home storage, wise management of personal and family resources, and emergency preparedness.

Stake and Ward Web Sites

The official [stake and ward Web sites](#) can be found in the About the Church channel or from the quick link in the bottom-right corner of the LDS.org home page. They are available to stakes and wards in the United States and Canada. They give the meetinghouse address for the ward or stake, times of Sunday meetings, a calendar of events, a membership directory, a leadership directory, lesson schedules, and more.

To register for access to your ward or stake site, you must obtain your membership record number and confirmation date from your ward clerk.

We are listening to the many suggestions we have received about how to make these sites more helpful, and future revisions will incorporate these suggestions, as well as extend their use to wards and stakes in other countries.

Because of legal and privacy issues, Church policy prohibits the creation of other Web sites as official sites for your ward, stake, family history center, auxiliary, quorum, class, Scout unit, committee for a special event, or other Church entity. Of course, individuals are free to create personal Web sites representing their personal opinions and testimonies and are encouraged to link to Church Web sites and other sites that uphold Church standards.

What's Coming

Directories

In the future, we plan to provide an expanded directory of visitors' centers, Deseret Industries

stores, canneries, institutes, seminaries, temples, meetinghouses, family history centers, LDS Family Services offices, and other locations, with information, schedules, and calendars of events.

Disabilities

In 2007, a new section will be added to LDS.org containing guidelines and helps for those with disabilities or special needs, for families who care for them, and for their Church leaders and teachers.

We are also just finalizing our accessibility guidelines for Church Web sites. Once completed, we will adapt portions of LDS.org to make them more accessible to those with disabilities or special needs.

FamilySearch

FamilySearch.org is the Church's site for genealogical research and family history work. It is the world's largest free genealogical Web site, with online access to billions of birth, marriage, death, and other genealogical records. It has over a million registered users. Many enhancements are being built for FamilySearch.

Feedback

Please use the [feedback link](#) when you have suggestions for Church Web sites. All the feedback is read, categorized, counted, and forwarded to the product managers over the various Church Web sites. Within the next few months, we will be upgrading our feedback system to make it easier to classify and route the many thousands of feedback messages so that the product managers can receive it more quickly.

General Conference and Other General Authority Addresses

This section contains the text, audio files, and video files of general conference addresses for many years in many languages. (*Note: The general priesthood meeting is not available in audio or video format.*) Later in 2007, this section will be upgraded to make it easier to use the conference talks.

A new section entitled Additional Addresses will also be created as a resource of talks by General Authorities given in Church satellite broadcasts and in other events.

URLs (Web Addresses)

Later in 2007, we will implement standardized URLs for the pages on LDS.org. Rather than the long URLs you see now, they will be shorter and, in most cases, human readable. This change will make it easier to cite them in online forums, blogs, or e-mails.

User Sign-in

In the future, we plan to provide the ability to establish a user name and sign-in identity so you can access software applications and information you may need for your calling (such as the Church Directory, handbooks, letters from headquarters, forms, and so on).

As of December 2006, this represented over 99% of the users of Church Web sites. We do not support Linux, Windows 95, or FreeBSD.

Technical Information

Browser Support

With Internet users utilizing many different browsers and many versions of these browsers, there are hundreds of different browsers in use today. Church Web sites are built to support only certain browsers, meaning that development and quality assurance resources are expended to ensure that a given browser works both visually and functionally for a Web site or application. We discontinue support for old browsers after their natural lifespan so we can apply resources to adopting the new capabilities in newer browsers. This results in sites that are easier to build and better designed.

Church Web sites are built to support W3C standards-compliant browsers. We currently support the following browsers:

- Internet Explorer 6.0, 6.0 (AOL), and 7.0
- Mozilla Firefox 1.x and 2.0
- MSN Explorer
- Safari 2.0.x and 1.3

As of December 2006, this represented over 98% of the users of Church Web sites. Other browsers (such as Netscape Navigator, Internet Explorer 5.2x [Mac], Opera, or WebTV Viewer) may still be fully functional, but we do not certify that they will work with a Church Web site.

Operating System and Platform Support

Church Web sites are built to work on the following operating systems:

- Windows XP and Media Center 2005
- Windows 2000/NT 5
- Windows 98
- Macintosh
