Continued after the first two years	<p>The Lord eventually delivered them from Lamanite bondage (Mosiah 21:15–22:16).</p> <p>The Lord was slow to hear them, but He softened the hearts of their enemies, who eased their burdens (21:15).</p> <p>They were not delivered at first (21:15).</p> <p>They prospered by degrees (21:16).</p> <p>They helped others (21:17).</p> <p>They covenanted to serve God (21:31).</p> <p>They gave wine to the Lamanite guards, who then fell asleep (22:7, 10).</p> <p>They escaped (22:11).</p>	Alma's people continued in peace and prosperity.
